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Day 2: Resilience and Hope

Lesson Title: "Strength for the Journey"

28 Have you not known? Have you not heard? The everlasting God, the Lord, The Creator of the ends of the earth, Neither faints nor is weary. His understanding is unsearchable. 29 He gives power to the weak, And to those who have no might He increases strength. 30 Even the youths shall faint and be weary, And the young men shall utterly fall, 31 But those who wait on the Lord Shall renew their strength; They shall mount up with wings like eagles, They shall run and not be weary, They shall walk and not faint."
Isaiah 40:28-31 NKJV

Biblical Context

Isaiah 40 marks a shift in the Book of Isaiah, often referred to as the beginning of "Deuteron-Isaiah" (Chapters 40-55), which focuses on comfort and hope for the exiled Israelites. This part of Isaiah was likely written during the Babylonian exile, a time when the people of Israel were feeling despondent and abandoned due to their captivity and the destruction of Jerusalem. The prophet Isaiah brings a message of reassurance that emphasizes God's power, faithfulness, and the promise of restoration.

Commentary on Isaiah 40:28-31

Verse 28: "Have you not known? Have you not heard? The everlasting God, the Lord, The Creator of the ends of the earth, Neither faints nor is weary. His understanding is unsearchable."

Commentary

The prophet begins by reminding the people of God's eternal nature. He poses rhetorical questions about God's everlasting presence and omnipotence, emphasizing that God is the Creator who does not grow tired or weary. His understanding is inscrutable, indicating that God's wisdom and power are beyond human comprehension.

Verse 29: "He gives power to the weak, And to those who have no might He increases strength."

Commentary

God is depicted as the source of strength for those who are weak and powerless. This is a message of hope for the exiled Israelites, suggesting that God will provide them with the strength they need to endure their current struggles.

Verse 30: “Even the youths shall faint and be weary, And the young men shall utterly fall,”

Commentary

This verse acknowledges that even the young and strong will grow tired and exhausted. It indicates that human strength is limited and cannot be relied upon indefinitely, contrasting with God's never-ending power.

Verse 31: “But those who wait on the Lord Shall renew their strength; They shall mount up with wings like eagles, They shall run and not be weary, They shall walk and not faint.”

Commentary

The concluding verse offers a promise: those who "wait on the Lord" or "hope in the Lord" will renew their strength. They will "mount up with wings like eagles," run without getting tired, and walk without fainting. This imagery conveys a sense of freedom, endurance, and renewed vitality, suggesting that trust in God will lead to inner strength and perseverance.

Key Words

1. *Wait* conveys the idea of waiting with hope and expectation. It implies a sense of looking forward to something with trust and patience, not in a passive sense but with an active anticipation that God will fulfill His promises.

2. *Strength* refers to physical or inner strength, power, or might. In the context of Isaiah 40:31, it suggests the renewal of vigor and the ability to persevere or endure, provided by God to those who trust in Him.

The lesson of Isaiah 40:28-31 centers around the themes of trust, hope, and reliance on God's power. In times of difficulty and weakness, recognizing that human resources are limited, Isaiah invites people to wait expectantly for the Lord, finding hope and renewal in His eternal strength.

Renewed Strength in Challenging Times
